
The sentiment of "out with the old and in with the new" perfectly summarizes the current reality of the evolving research landscape where it has become critical for organizations) to stay up-to-date with the latest trends and advancements in conducting research.

The Government of Kenya has been actively promoting digital transformation across various sectors, including government services. Initiatives like the Digital Literacy Program and the National ICT demonstrate Master Plan the government's commitment to enhancing access to digital tools and skills, fostering innovation, and improving service delivery to citizens. The digitalization of processes involves government agencies taking steps to expedite the adoption of ICT solutions. This aims to achieve ease of access, faster service delivery, cost reduction, and overall convenience and efficiency in services. The government's directive advocates for re-engineering business processes and utilizing digital technologies to enhance service delivery. For The Centre, it entails aligning The Centre's structures, functions, policies, and strategies to facilitate progressive digitalization.

In response to this, the NCRC recently embraced this paradigm shift by implementing automation of its research processes. This strategic decision stemmed from recognizing the inherent limitations and inefficiencies associated with traditional data collection techniques.

Since its inception in 1997, NCRC has been at the forefront in crime research and analysis, utilizing the power of data to inform policies and initiatives aimed at creating safer communities. However, the Centre's reliance on paper and pen (PAPI) for data collection presented challenges in terms of cost, time, and accuracy. Recognizing the need for change, NCRC recently revised its Strategic Plan 2023-2027 prioritizing Key Result Areas for implementation. This included Strategic Crime Research and Information Management, Sustainable Institutional Strengthening, Adaptability and Visibility, Digitalization and Automation of Centre's Processes and Strategic Collaboration, Partnership and Networking

The journey towards automation at NCRC commenced with the establishment of a dedicated Research Digitalization Committee tasked with spearheading the initiative. Drawing insights from benchmarking exercises with leading agencies such as the Kenya National Bureau of Statistics (KNBS) and Population Council, NCRC identified best practices for automating its research processes. Through this collaborative effort, tailored solutions were developed to suit the unique needs of NCRC in crime research, ensuring optimal outcomes in data collection and analysis.



In rolling out the automation process, The Centre has utilized this process in the study on Managing the Dangerous Drift in Livestock Rustling and Banditry in Kenya. It has revolutionized the research processes, enabling us to achieve greater efficiency, accuracy, and timeliness in delivering crime research reports. Moving forward, the digitalization of the research process is expected to expedite research procedures significantly. It has eliminated numerous manual processes such as data serialization, data coding, and data entry thus expected to facilitate the timely release of Crime Research reports.

#### Unveiling The Realities Of Livestock Rustling And Banditry In Kenya: A Comprehensive Exploration Of Twelve Days Of Data Collection

The National Crime Research Centre recently conducted a groundbreaking research study, spanning twelve days, delving into the intricate web of livestock rustling and banditry in Kenya. This extensive investigation uncovered a myriad of experiences, emotions, and challenges, providing a comprehensive view of the multifaceted issue.

The research journey commenced with a visual feast of the breathtaking landscapes in the counties visited, captivating researchers with its natural beauty. A backdrop of stunning panoramas added a unique dimension to the strenuous undertaking, demonstrating the coexistence of serenity and adversity. Despite the serious nature of the study, the researchers found moments of light-heartedness during the road trip, fostering camaraderie and resilience. This unexpected aspect of the journey provided a balance to the gravity of the subject matter.

Beneath the surface of the outwardly captivating journey lay the demanding reality of a rigorous data collection process. The researchers encountered challenges that tested their patience and diligence, emphasizing the intensity of their mission. Navigating through rough terrain emerged as a significant challenge, slowing down movement and impeding the overall research process. The topography itself became a difficult obstacle in the pursuit of data.

The commitment to obtaining accurate and representative data led the researchers to trek long distances in search of respondents since most of these areas are sparsely populated which contradicted the allocated sample size. This aspect emphasized the dedication required to delve into the heart of the The diversity of languages communication challenges, particularly in Meru, Tana River, Samburu and Turkana where valuable information risked being lost in translation. Overcoming these barriers is pivotal for ensuring accurate and culturally sensitive data.

A manifestation of disillusionment with the government, some respondents exhibited hostility, underscoring the societal discontent that contributes to the persistence of livestock rustling and banditry. Even the basic need for accommodation became a challenge, shedding light on the practical difficulties faced by researchers and the communities alike.

A closer look at the bandits' communities exposed retrogressive cultural practices that play a role in perpetuating criminal activities. Understanding these dynamics is crucial for devising effective interventions. Disturbingly, some communities exhibited a normalization of cattle rustling and banditry, revealing the deep-seated nature of these issues and the challenges of changing entrenched attitudes. A sobering revelation emerged concerning the diminishing value placed on human life within the context of livestock rustling and banditry. This stark reality highlighted the urgent need for comprehensive interventions to address the root causes of these issues.



The research process brought to the surface painful memories for some respondents who were victims of bandits. Addressing the emotional toll on participants became an essential consideration in conducting ethical research. The research unveiled the harsh living conditions in poverty-stricken communities, shedding light on the socio-economic factors contributing to the prevalence of livestock rustling and banditry.

In the midst of the hardships, a positive encounter with the natural world occurred in Meru Park, where the researchers marveled at the abundance of beautiful elephants. This juxtaposition provided a brief respite from the intensity of the research. The experience prompted reflections on the beauty of life and a heightened awareness of God's presence. This personal dimension added depth to the researchers' understanding of the communities they were studying. The research team also showcased remarkable cohesion and collaboration. The significance of effective teamwork in navigating the complexities of the research process became evident, highlighting the importance of collective effort in addressing societal issues.

The collaborative sessions, designed to mold NCRC's future Research Agenda and Strategy, brought together a diverse spectrum of stakeholders.

This Included National Police Service, Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions, The Judiciary, Kenya Prison Service, Probation and Aftercare Services, Directorate of Children's Services, Ministry of Interior and National Administration, as well as experts from academia (Technical University of Kenya, The University of Nairobi, The Institute for Development Studies Based at The University of Nairobi, The Centre for Human Rights and Policy Studies and United States International University - Africa). and policy experts (Haki Institute Equality Now, Mathare Social Justice Centre, Legal Resources Foundation Trust, International Commission of Jurists, Independent Medical - Legal Unit

and Amnesty International Kenya). The goal was to contribute valuable insights and perspectives towards NCRC's mission of advancing crime research and justice reform.

The roundtable discussion launched on February 19th and concluded on March 23rd 2024, provided a strategic platform for cultivating insightful discussions, sharing knowledge, and fostering consensus on critical topics. Structured into a 10-point framework, the critical areas for discussion were thoughtfully crafted to address key aspects such as identifying research priorities, exploring critical research gaps, enhancing policy relevance, brainstorming innovative solutions, fostering strategic partnerships, assessing the perceived impact of NCRC's research initiatives, and identifying specific thematic areas for study.

### NCRC Launches Webinar Series On Security And Justice

The National Crime Research Center (NCRC) has launched a series of bi-monthly webinars titled "Security and Justice Features." The inaugural webinar of the bi-monthly series was held on February 29th, 2024, under the theme "Who Should the Police be in the 21st Century" and was chaired by Dr. Julie Berg, Director of the Scottish Centre for Crime & Justice Research (SCCJR).

Setting a dynamic tone for discussion on contemporary policing, it featured distinguished guest speakers, including NCRC's Director/CEO Dr. Mutuma Ruteere, who delivered a thought-provoking talk on "Where does policing go from here? Dilemmas of policing in Africa," and Prof. Jennifer Wood, who explored "The shifting harmscapes of policing: Reflections on the police idea." Being the first, it garnered participation from a diverse audience, including academic researchers, policymakers, and practitioners.

In collaboration with The Global Risk Governance Programme, Scottish Centre for Crime & Justice Research (SCCJR), and The University of Nairobi, the "Security and Justice Features" webinar series aims to delve into the complex dilemmas, re-imaginings, and future trajectories of security and justice from a cross-regional perspective. By featuring speakers representing northern and southern contexts, the series fosters an engaging dialogue among diverse audiences, facilitating a mutual exchange of insights and perspectives on the evolving landscapes of security and justice worldwide.



On the 6th of November 2023, a significant development took place in Kenya's environmental calendar as The Cabinet Secretary for the Ministry of Interior and National Coordination, Kithure Kindiki, announced the official designation of November 13th as a public holiday: National Tree Growing Day. This announcement came through a gazette notice, marking a momentous occasion for environmental conservation and community engagement across the country.

This public holiday is a critical component of Kenya's ambitious initiative to plant 15 billion trees by 2032 for restoration of 10.6 million hectares by 2032 toward combating climate change, which is recognized as a pressing global crisis affecting ecosystems, biodiversity, and human livelihoods worldwide.







In support of this initiative and toward demonstrating its commitment to environmental conservation and sustainability, The National Crime Research Centre joined hands with other stakeholders including government agencies and non-state actors in planting over 5000 trees at the Bomas Beat Forest. Felix Koskei, who was the Chief Guest, emphasized the critical role that trees play in environmental conservation and ecosystem balance. 
